

The **EStrella Piano Duo** burst onto the musical scene in 2011 with a series of concerts celebrating the great Russian masterpieces for piano duet. Their first performance evoked raves of "technical brilliance" and "infectious joy in music making". The second drew a standing-room-only crowd. Since then, they have performed widely to enthusiastic audiences and critical acclaim. The 2015-16 concert season alone took the Duo to six states plus the District of Columbia in the US and to several cities in China. 2017 featured both a Canadian and an orchestral debut. In 2018 the Duo was awarded a Global Music Award Silver medal for their critically acclaimed new CD, *Tales from the East*, featuring stories of adventure, magic and romance by Russian composers. EStrellas's upcoming year will again take the Duo all over the United States, with numerous repeat engagements.

The Duo's repertoire includes, besides the usual favorites, many rarely-heard, fascinating works that most duos fear to touch. Their programs are always musically profound, but also virtuostic, often acrobatic, and occasionally humorous, always with introductions which draw the listeners into the music.

<u>Elena Doubovitskaya</u> and <u>Svetlana Belsky</u> are accomplished pianists in their own right. Between the two, they have been heard throughout Europe, Asia and the United States. Their concert credits include Carnegie (Weill) Hall, Kiev Philharmonic Hall, Chicago Symphony Center, St. Petersburg Rimsky-Korsakoff Museum, Baptist University of Hong Kong, Ravinia and Tanglewood Music Festivals, among many others. Critics praise them for "marvelous and extraordinary playing" and "confidence and élan". Elena and Svetlana are also accomplished teachers, who enjoy sharing their love for music with new generations of pianists.



A native of Russia, Elena Doubovitskaya performed her debut recital in Carnegie Hall's Weill Recital Hall as part of Artists International Presentations, followed by numerous engagements in United States, Germany, Austria, Czech Republic and Russia. Dr. Doubovitskaya's accomplishments include awards from Artists International Presentations, the Seattle International Piano Competition and the Ibla Grand Prize Competition. She has performed at the Tanglewood Music Festival, Prague International Piano Master Classes and East-West Music Festival in Germany, among others, and has participated in master classes with Emanuel Ax, James Levine, Leif Ove Andsnes, Garrick Ohlsson, and Menahem Pressler. Dr. Doubovitskaya received her undergraduate degree from the Ural State "Mussorgsky" Conservatory in Ekaterinburg, Russia, followed by a Master's Degree from the Manhattan School of Music under Solomon Mikowsky and a Doctorate Degree in Piano Performance from Northwestern University

under Ursula Oppens. Currently Dr. Doubovitskaya is a member of the piano and chamber music faculty at the Merit School of Music in Chicago, and serves as the Chairman of its Piano Department.

Critically acclaimed as "a passionate pianist and scholar", Svetlana Belsky is an in-demand recitalist and chamber pianist, noted for her remarkable rapport with audiences and stylistic versatility. She has appeared in the Ukraine, Russia, Poland, Italy, China, Taiwan and Hong Kong, and throughout the United States. Her performance credits include Carnegie Recital Hall, Kiev Philharmonic Hall, Dame Myra Hess Series, Music in the Loft, countless university concert series, live recitals on Chicago's WFMT and New York's WQXR, and guest appearances with the University of Chicago Symphony, Southern Illinois Symphony, Chicago Chamber Orchestra and the Tutti Orchestra. Dr. Belsky has received awards both for her performances in international piano competitions, and for her advocacy of new American music. Her recordings have been heard on radio stations worldwide. Her annotated translation of Busoni as Pianist has been featured on BBC Radio 3. Following emigration from the Soviet Union, Dr. Belsky studied with Emilio Del Rosario in Chicago. She earned her Bachelor of Music summa cum laude and



Master's degrees from the Peabody Conservatory of Music, studying with Ann Schein. Later, she earned her Doctorate in Performance at the Manhattan School of Music, working with Nina Svetlanova

Sample Programs Available for 2019-2021

- Tales from the East (two pianos or one piano-four hands). Transcriptions of beloved works such as *Scheherazade* and *Polovetsian Dances*, along with other works by Rachmaninoff, Tchaikovsky, Prokofiev and Stravinsky
- **Russian Favorites** (two pianos). The magnificent Suite No. 2 by Rachmaninoff, settings of Rachmaninoff's Songs, *Pictures at an Exhibition* and more
- A Celebration of the Waltz (for one piano four hands or two pianos). Ravel's La Valse opens with a vision of tragedy, and an uproarious and acrobatic setting of The Blue Danube Waltzes by Greg Anderson lightens the mood
- Shall We Dance? (one piano/four hands). Dance music from Bach to Khatchaturian, featuring well-known original masterpieces and interesting transcriptions
- **Mozart and Friends** (two pianos). Starting with Mozart's great Sonata for Two pianos, this program moves on to variations, transcriptions and paraphrases by other composers ranging from the serious to the *Ragtime a la Turca* by Greg Anderson
- The Rite of Spring (one piano). Stravinsky's piano duet setting is often performed on two pianos, but the EStrella Duo showcases the far more difficult original one piano version
- Music by French and German composers (for one piano). Works by Debussy, Ravel, Bach, Mozart, Beethoven and Mendelssohn

These programs may of course be combined in any way that best suits the venue and the audience.

Album Review: Tales From the East

Anyone who thinks classical music is boring needs to check out Tales From the East, a collection of dramatic piano duets by Russian composers performed by the EStrella Piano Duo. (If you still aren't convinced, take a look at some of their YouTube videos!) The Duo is Svetlana Belsky and Elena Doubovitskaya, both extraordinary pianists and teachers. Dr. Belsky is Head of the Piano Department at the University of Chicago and Dr. Doubovistkaya is Chair of the Piano Department at The Merit School of Music, also in Chicago. They began performing together in 2011 with a series of concerts that celebrated the great Russian masterpieces for piano duet. They have since performed all over the US, Canada, Asia and Europe to rave reviews. This is their second album, following their 2013 debut, Russian Masterpieces. Both artists are also members of the award-winning multi-piano ensemble, Pianissimo!, which was established in 2014. From the liner notes of Tales From the East: "The Duo's repertoire includes, besides the usual favorites, many rarely-heard, fascinating works that most duos fear to touch. Their programs are always musically profound, but also virtuosic, often acrobatic, and occasionally humorous."

Tales From the East begins with three movements from Petrushka by Igor Stravinsky (1882-1971) arranged for two pianos by V. Babin. The first is "Danse russe" (Russian Dance), a a wildly energetic piece that will be familiar to most listeners from its use in other media. The second movement is "Chez Petrouchka" (Petrushka's Room), an intricate and dazzling expression of many moods and a variety of thoughts. The third is "La semaine grasse" (The Shrovetide Fair), a 10-minute tour de force that is often playful and carefree with varying degrees of intensity. I'd love to see this one played live!

Nicolai Rimsky-Korsakov (1844-1908) is represented with the epic "Festival in Bagdad" from Schecherazade. Many themes from this work will also be familiar to most listeners even if they have never studied classical music. Dramatic, intense and extremely flashy, I'd love to see this one played live, too!

The next four tracks are movements from Alexander Borodin's (1833-87) Polovetsian Dances from Prince Igor. The first is the "Andantino," made famous as "Stranger in Paradise" from the musical Kismet. "Allegro Vivo" is just that - a lively dance that flies all over the piano keyboard(s) with wild abandon. "Allegro" is often used in films and cartoons as a dramatic depiction of struggles against huge (if not impossible) odds. Dark and intense with an underlying sense of fun, it's a great arrangement! "Presto" may not be quite as familiar, but overflows with joyous energy and dazzling piano technique. Themes from the "Andantino" movement are also reintroduced in a variety of variations. Awesome in the truest sense of the word!

The last track is "Suite-Fantasy on Prokofiev's Cinderella," an epic work at just a hair under 14 minutes. While this piece has plenty of bold, intricate passages, it also gives the EStrella Duo a chance to show their more tender, lyrical side. I have no doubt that Sergei Prokofiev (1891-1953) would be more than proud of this arrangement and performance of his music!

I am so excited to have been introduced to the EStrella Duo and look forward to future releases and (hopefully!!!) a chance to see them perform live! Brava!!!

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The German Society of Pennsylvania

We concluded our very successful 2013/14 classical concert season on Sunday, May 18, with the magnificent EStrella Piano Duo – comprised of two Soviet émigrés, Elena Doubovitskaya

and Svetlana Belsky, who currently live in Chicago. Three years ago, they burst on the musical scene with a series of Russian masterpieces for four hands. Their breathtaking performance in our hall, including the very personal introductions of each piece by Svetlana, certainly kept me in thrall.

The program was an extraordinary rendition of the Russian soul contained in the composer's music. It opened with Greg Anderson's fascinating transcription of Sergei Rachmaninoff's Vocalise. Apart from its obvious attraction of soulful melody, this work showcased the performers' ability to coordinate and choreograph their motions and to breathe in perfect unison.

Next, the Polovestian Dances (from Borodin's opera Prince Igor) presented more unforgettable melodies, and grew in energy to a rousing finale. Pianistic fireworks abounded in Stravinsky's Rite of Spring in EStrella's version of the composer's transcription for four hands. In the ballet, you could hear young men strut and thump, the girls glide and enchant. The pianists' hands produced orchestral sonorities while preforming acrobatics on the keyboard. A different and lovelier version of Spring was seen in the "March", "April" and "May" movements of Tchaikovsky's Seasons, with their entrancing Russian melodies, gentle colors and evanescent moods.

The pre-intermission part of the concert concluded with another Stravinsky masterpiece, Petrushka. Again, the duo delighted in the bright, almost harsh colors of the music, its driving energy and technical brilliance.

The second half opened with the final movement of Rimsky-Korsakov's Scheherazade. Who needs an orchestra when you have twenty (20) fingers like these? The EStrella duo delighted in the sensuality, rich color palette and profound beauty of the score. Another offering from Rachmaninoff, this time a set of the original works from Opus 11 for piano duo changed the mood to quiet contemplation that grew into passion, and allowed the duo to showcase yet another side of their musical personality. Good humor and amiable enjoyment prevail in the works by a lesser known Russian composer, Valery Gavrilin. Clever pianistic effects, gentle irony, and glorious Russian melodiousness were heard throughout.

The concert came to an uproarious conclusion with Greg Anderson's irreverent (some might say insane) fantasy on Johann Strauss' Blue Danube Waltz. The four hands of the pianists imitated four dancing feet, and the pianists had to do their utmost to avoid tripping on one another's fingers, elbows, arms and even hair, while creating an ever-changing vision of Viennese waltz – from grand, to tender, to maniacal. The technical and musical requirements of the piece are such that only a select few of duos dare to attempt it. The result was a performance that needed to be seen, and did not fail to bring the audience to its feet!
